Now that we know where they came from, let's see what some people I talked to say. Here's what they said:


"They're too minty." says Adrianna F..

The Classic SUGAR Cookie RECIPE

Ingredients:

3 cups all-purpose flour
¾ teaspoon baking powder
¼ teaspoon salt
4 cup unsalted butter,softened
1 cup of sugar
1 egg, beaten
1 tablespoon milk
Powdered sugar,for rolling out dough

Directions:

- 1 Sift together flour, baking powder, and salt. Set aside. Place butter and sugar in a large bowl of electric stand mixer and beat until light in color. Add egg and milk and beat to combine. Put the mixer on low speed, gradually add flour, and beat until mixture pulls away from the side of the bowl. Divide the dough in half, wrap in waxed paper, and refrigerate for 2 hours.
- 2 preheat your oven to 375 degrees F
- 3 Sprinkle the surface where you will roll out dough with powdered sugar. Remove 1 wrapped pack of dough from refrigerator at a time, sprinkle rolling pin with powdered sugar, and roll out dough to 1/4-inch thick. Move the dough around and check underneath frequently to make sure it is not sticking. If dough has warmed during rolling, place cold cookie sheet on top for 10 minutes to chill. Cut into desired shape, place at least 1-inch apart on greased baking sheet, parchment, or silicone baking mat, and bake for 7 to 9 minutes or until cookies are just beginning to turn brown around the edges, rotating cookie sheet halfway through baking time. Let sit on baking sheet for 2 minutes after removal from oven and then move to complete cooling on wire rack. Serve as is or ice as desired. Store in an airtight container for up to 1 week. You can finish it off with sprinkles, then enjoy!!

They moved away from the house and never spoke of that night again. But every Christmas Eve, they could hear the faint whisper of the child's voice, calling out for help from the chimney.







Christmas Traditions Around the World

Japan - "Back in 1974, the American fast food restaurant KFC released a festive marketing campaign in Japan. The seemingly simple slogan "Kurisumasu ni wa kentakkii!" (Kentucky for Christmas!) spawned a national tradition that still thrives to this day."

Germany - "The Christmas tree tradition embraced around the world today is believed to have started in Germany back in the 16th Century, so it comes as no surprise that our continental cousins still have some unique customs relating to the festive conifers. One of these is to hide a pickle somewhere within the branches of the tree, and give a gift to whichever child in the household finds it."

Finland - "Many homes in Finland come equipped with their own sauna, and at Christmas time this cozy spot becomes a sacred space associated with long dead ancestors. On Christmas Eve, it's customary to strip naked and take a long and respectful stint in the sauna, which is also believed to be home to the legendary sauna 'elf'."

Italy - "Forget Santa and 25th December when in Italy, as all the action takes place on the eve of 5th January. According to folklore, an old woman named Belfana visits all the children of Italy to fill their stockings with candy and leave them presents if they've been good. Just like Father Christmas, Belfana enters through the chimney and is left treats by the children who live there - typically wine and local delicacies."

Iceland - "One of the more unique festive traditions we've heard of comes from Iceland, where a giant cat is said to roam the snowy countryside at Christmas time. Traditionally, farmers would use the Yule Cat as an incentive for their workers - those who worked hard would receive a new set of clothes, but those who didn't would be devoured by the gigantic cat-like beast."

Norway - "According to Norwegian folklore, Christmas Eve is the day when mischievous spirits and witches take to the skies for mischief and general tomfoolery. As witches often use brooms as their preferred mode of transportation, it's tradition for Norwegian families to hide away any sweeping sticks where the witches won't be able to find them."

New Zealand - "The Kiwis are all about the pōhutukawa, a beautiful tree that is native to New Zealand with gnarled roots and bright crimson flowers. Today, the pōhutukawa tree is a recognised symbol of Christmas around New Zealand and is featured on Christmas cards, decorations, and even in the Christmas carols that children sing at school."

Sweden - "Last but not least, we have one more Christmas tradition from Sweden - which may just be the oldest tradition still celebrated on the list. A Timeline of Famous Holiday Gifts

WHAT KIDS ASKED FOR THROUGH THE YEARS

1900s - The Victor Talking Machine (now known as Victrola) invented the first machine to play music (a phonograph). The headquarters were nearby in Camden, NJ. The newly created teddy bear was also popular, nicknamed after President Theodore (Teddy) Roosevelt. Small, personal, hand-held cameras created by Kodak were also popular then.

1910s - Raggedy Ann & Andy dolls were made then, they were a different kind of doll. They were rag dolls with red wool hair, a smiling face, and button eyes. Another popular gift was the rocking horse. Other than those, there weren't many new things made then.

1920s - Famous toys during this time included Lincoln Logs and Tinker Toys. These toys are all similar to Legos, but Lincoln Logs uses logs, and Tinker Toys uses various materials like sticks and circular pieces.

A.C. Gilbert Chemistry Sets were also popular but were created mainly for boys. A girls' version was created in the 1950s. The first modern yo-yo was created around this time. When yo-yos first started producing, around 300,000 were made per day.

1930s- In these years, the great depression was going on so families could not afford fancy gifts. Instead, things like fruits and homemade items such as quilts, blankets, and dolls were given. Another classic game known as Monopoly gained popularity in these years.

1940s - Toy army men were very famous, especially since World War II had recently ended. Cap guns experienced lots of popularity during this period. Cap guns release small amounts of smoke when fired. Kids loved to battle each other with these! Slinkies were created during this time, and their ability to walk down the stairs made them very popular and attractive. They were created by the naval engineer, Richard T. James.

1950s - As the US recovered from the war, gift-giving came back. In these years, Little People and Mr. Potato Heads were made. Other popular gifts were Matchbox cars which are like Hot Wheels cars but more realistic, and silly putty.

1960s - Famous dolls were created in the 1960s such as Barbie and Ken, and their famous competition at this time, a talking doll, named Chatty Cathy. If her string was pulled, she would speak one out of eleven phrases. The Easy Bake Oven was created to teach young children how to bake, using two lightbulbs as a heat source. In the 1960s, Hasbro also created the G.I. Joe Doll, which was a big upgrade from plastic toy soldiers.

1970s - The game of Risk made its way into many households in the 1970s. Other new gifts were Nerf balls, Uno, and Etch-A-Sketch. Another popular toy (and is still popular today) is Lego. Legos were introduced into the United States in the 1960s and became popular in the early 1970s.

1980s - The Rubik's Cube was very popular, with 200 million sold worldwide. Cabbage Patch Dolls were immensely popular, but they have been known to have children's fingers or hair caught in the doll's mouth. The dolls were recalled because of that. Also, the Atari, and Game Boy were popular gaming consoles during this time.

1990s - The 1990s brought Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles. Video games were also starting to be developed, with the Game Boy, Nintendo 64, and Tamagotchi. Tamagotchi is a virtual pet simulation game on a keychain where you must take care of a virtual pet. In 1998, a new toy called Furby came out. In both the years 1998 and 1999, over 15 million Furbies were sold.

2000s - Furbies were popular animatronics, that could even repeat words that you said! Rainbow Loom was very popular, as kids were obsessed with friendship bracelets during this time. Razor scooters were also popular and were even named the Spring/Summer Toy of the Year, in 2000.

2010s - Christmas gifts got even smaller and much more expensive, as most kids asked for something Apple-related, including things like an iPhone, iPad, and iPod. New gaming consoles were also popular such as the Xbox 1, PS4 and the Nintendo 3DS.
